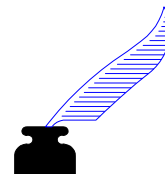

ARRL EXPO 2005 TO HIGHLIGHT LEAGUE'S NATIONAL CONVENTION IN DAYTON

If you've never been to Dayton Hamvention, then this is the year. That's because Hamvention will host the 2005 ARRL National Convention May 20-22. A special feature of the event will be "ARRL Expo 2005," a separate area at Hara Arena that will highlight what the League means to Amateur Radio.

"ARRL Expo 2005 will be a special feature of the Convention," says ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, who's helping to coordinate the event. "ARRL Expo will showcase ARRL membership benefits and services as well as the activities of ARRL volunteers. Visitors will be able to meet ARRL volunteers and staff knowledgeable on a wide variety of topics, and, of course, have their cards checked for operating awards."

Hamvention has donated a separate section of floor space for ARRL Expo 2005. The large area is convenient to the flea market and indoor exhibit areas--and it's just a short walk from the Ballerina entrance to Hara Arena. While the Expo area will complement the traditional ARRL concession in North Hall, it will operate independently.

ARRL Expo will offer the opportunity to meet and greet ARRL staff members and volunteers--including representatives of DXCC, the Amateur Radio Emergency Service and other ARRL entities and programs that span the wide variety of interests that comprise Amateur Radio.

The National Association of Radio and Telecommunications Engineers (NARTE) will be attending Hamvention as guests of the ARRL National Convention. ARRL and NARTE have a memorandum of understanding to support mutually beneficial programs and activities. NARTE representatives will be on hand at the ARRL exhibit and will provide FCC General Radiotelephone Operator License (GROL) examinations to interested applicants. The testing fee, not included in the Hamvention admission price, is \$40. Register or get more information from the NARTE Web site or by calling NARTE toll-free at 800-89-NARTE (800-896-2783).

Inderbitzen notes that ARRL Expo 2005 will be the place to pick up a free "ARRL Passport" to get a 2005 ARRL

National Convention keepsake when making qualifying purchases from participating retailers at Hamvention.

The ARRL ad hoc National Convention Committee has been meeting since last July to help make Dayton Hamvention 2005 a memorable ARRL National Convention. New England Division Director Tom Frenaye, K1KI, chairs the committee. Members are ARRL Great Lakes Director Jim Weaver, K8JE, Dakota Division Director Jay Bellows, KOQB, Midwest Division Director Wade Walstrom, W0EJ, and ARRL Sales and Marketing Manager Dennis Motschenbacher, K7BV.

The theme of Dayton Hamvention 2005 is "Bringing hams together from around the world." Upward of 25,000 visitors from the US and elsewhere on the globe make the annual pilgrimage to Hamvention, where socializing is a big part of the fun.

In addition to the popular indoor and outdoor exhibits and vendors, Dayton Hamvention 2005 will feature a full slate of forums and other activities. As they say, "If you can't find it at Dayton, you'll never find it." It's not too soon to purchase tickets for Dayton Hamvention 2005. Early birds can save \$5 by getting their tickets online at the Hamvention Web site. Hamvention has eliminated the on-line handling charge.

FCC Still Working on Morse NPRM

March 1, 2005 --- Today the ARRL released on their web-site the following news about the Morse code requirements for US hams:

The FCC continues to work toward developing a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) that will spell out what the Commission has in mind with respect to possible changes in the current Morse code requirement and Amateur Radio licensing. A total of 18 petitions have been filed, including one from the ARRL, seeking Part 97 rule changes addressing the future of the 5 WPM Morse requirement (Element 1) and revisions to the overall Amateur Radio licensing structure. The FCC plans to tackle all 18 in a single proceeding. As far as the code issue is concerned, petitions--and comments in response to them--run the gamut from retaining or even beefing up the Morse requirement to eliminating it altogether. (The ARRL's proposal would retain the 5 WPM Morse examination for Amateur Extra class applicants only.) The League and others have also put forth proposals for a new entry-level Amateur Radio license class. At this point, personnel in the FCC Wireless Telecommunications Bureau are continuing to review the thousands of comments filed on the 18 petitions. While the FCC appears unlikely to release an NPRM any sooner than mid-year, the issue still may be a major discussion topic at the FCC Forum at Dayton Hamvention, May 20-22. Once public, the NPRM would initiate another round of comments on what the FCC has proposed. It could be late 2006 or even into 2007 before the FCC releases a Report and Order to implement any new rules, although it's possible the Commission could wrap up the proceeding before that time frame

Helpful Hints...

Ed KA7UKN reminds us of a great way to demagnetize tools or other small metal parts. "I had a screwdriver that was magnetized and it was driving me crazy (no pun intended). I grabbed my trusty Weller 250-watt gun, pressed the trigger and passed the screwdriver through the loop formed by the tip. In a second or two I had the desired results. It was so fast and so effective that I purposely magnetized the tool over again with the strongest bar magnet that I have. A few passes between the loop formed by the solder gun's tip degaussed the tool. Where has this been all of my life?"

- Sections of bicycle tire inner tubes

Modes and Categories: Phone and CW on 80/40/20/15/10 meters. Single-op, multi-op, and mobile categories. Single-op entries are categorized by output power, QRP (5W or less), Low Power (100W or less), and High Power (greater than 100W)

Multipliers: Work stations once per band and mode. Work other states and Michigan Stations. MI to MI QSO's are allowed. Work portables and mobiles again as they change county, state or province.

Exchange: Exchange QSO number and location (county for MI stations, state/province or "DX" for others).

Scoring: One point per phone QSO, two points per CW QSO. Count multipliers once per mode. Multipliers are MI counties for all entries, plus states & provinces for MI entries only. Final score is total QSO points times total multipliers.

Freqs: Suggested frequencies: CW-3545, 7045, 14045, 21045, 28045; Phone-3850, 7225, 14250, 21300, 28450.

"It Seems to Us . . ."

Death by a Thousand Cuts

Editor's note: Typically, only ARRL members get to read the "It Seems to Us ..." editorials that run each month in QST. We're posting this editorial that appears in the March, 2005 issue of QST in the hope that both ARRL members and nonmembers might appreciate it and find it informative.

Threats to radio amateurs' access to the radio spectrum come in several forms.

We can lose allocations, either at the international or the domestic level. The ARRL and the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) devote a lot of resources to the protection and expansion of our international allocations through the International Telecommunication Union and regional telecommunications organizations. In its Washington-area Technical Relations Office the ARRL has four full-time staff pursuing the same objectives at the national level. Through the efforts of the ARRL and the IARU, outright losses are rare; gains are more common.

New sharing arrangements can be imposed on us that reduce the utility of our bands. The bands between 420 MHz and 24 GHz are especially vulnerable because our allocations are on a secondary basis, meaning that at least one and sometimes more services have primary allocations and therefore can claim priority over us. Historically, the biggest user of these shared bands has been the military. Their systems must be resistant to interference anyway, so we have been able to coexist pretty well. However, as new uses for this highly desirable part of the spectrum are developed, even the Pentagon has to accede to commercial pressures for reallocation--and commercial sharing partners may be much more difficult for us to live with.

The most insidious threat comes not from new allocations to licensed services, but from the proliferation of unlicensed radio frequency (RF) devices. We have always had to cope with some interference from incidental radiators, such as electric motors, that are not intentionally designed to generate RF energy but do so in the normal course of operation. Other kinds of devices intentionally generate RF energy, but the radiation of the energy is unintentional; radio and television receivers, computers, and power line carrier systems fall into this category. Still others intentionally radiate, but at levels low enough that the FCC does not regard them as significant interference sources (an issue on which we find ourselves in frequent disagreement). Finally, there are unlicensed personal communications devices that are confined to specific frequency bands and are subject to technical regulations designed to limit their interference potential to licensed services as well as to one another.

The public benefits greatly from many kinds of unlicensed devices. The garage door opener is a good example of an appropriate use for an unlicensed, intentional radiator. Commanding the door to open requires just a brief burst of RF, and commands are sent so infrequently that any resulting interference is insignificant. Few people who have garage door openers would want to give them up.

With careful selection of appropriate frequency bands and appropriate technical constraints, the public can benefit from further expansion of intentional radiators and personal communications devices. But the caveat is important. Some of these devices have high duty cycles, occupy large bandwidths, and operate at power levels that are sufficient to make them significant interference sources. While it is not fully utilized everywhere, all the time, the radio spectrum is fully allocated. Unlicensed RF devices are frequently incompatible with incumbent services and users.

On paper, licensed services always have priority. Operators of unlicensed devices have no rights. The devices themselves may only operate if no harmful interference is caused, and they must accept any interference that may be caused by the operation of an authorized radio station. When we licensees raise concerns about the proliferation of unlicensed devices we are told, "Don't worry. You're protected. Just look at the rules."

But reality is different. Enforcement action is rarely taken to protect licensed services. For more than six months the ARRL has been calling to the FCC's attention ongoing harmful interference caused by Broadband over Power Line (BPL) systems. The FCC has yet to pay more than lip service to its obligation to enforce its own "no harmful interference" regulation.

Or take the benign garage door opener, for example. For reasons that must have sounded good at the time, manufacturers decided to use frequencies in a military band. When the military began using a new communications system, garage doors stopped opening. On paper, that isn't the military's problem. But it is at minimum both a public relations headache and a distraction.

For years, the ARRL has fought a persistent and often lonely battle against the FCC's excessively permissive approach to unlicensed devices. We do so because the cumulative effect of an uncontrolled proliferation of unlicensed devices is to inflict "death by a thousand cuts" on licensed radio services. Every unlicensed emission in a band used by a licensed service diminishes the capability and the value of that service, sometimes at the risk of public safety. Every consumer device that is prone to interference is a potential neighbor-relations nightmare.

BPL is the extreme example. It is not a spectrum user because it is not an intentional radiator. To the extent that it radiates, it is purely and simply a spectrum polluter. And it will radiate, and therefore pollute, because power lines are an inappropriate medium for a high-frequency RF signal.

In the words of one unusually forthcoming BPL engineer, "This would be a lot easier if we could repeal the laws of physics."

Something to think about, isn't it Or "it won't happen here", will it?

Constitution of the Lapeer County Amateur Radio Association

Article I Title

The following constitution shall supersede any previous constitution of the Lapeer County Amateur Radio Association.

Article II Name and Objectives

The name of this organization shall be 'The Lapeer County Amateur Radio Association' (LCARA). The association's objectives shall be those set forth in the Federal Communication Commission Rules and Regulations for the Amateur Radio Service; the representation of member Amateur Radio Operators in legislative and FCC matters; promotion of fraternalism among those interested in the Amateur Radio Service; enhancement of the image of Amateur Radio Operators in the minds of the general public; encouraging the furtherance of both formal and self taught education in electronics and radio communications; and such other activities as shall be in keeping with and in promotion of these objectives.

Article III Membership

There shall be two classes of membership in the association.

Licensed members: Shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of membership, including the right to vote and to hold office in the association.

Associate members: (non-licensed) shall have all the rights and privileges of membership, but shall have no right to vote or to hold office in the association.

Membership may be terminated as follows: Non-payment of dues within ninety days of their due date shall automatically result in suspension of membership until the dues are paid.

Article IV Dues

Membership dues shall due at the October General Membership meeting. The Executive Board, as defined in Article VII, may suspend dues for any member where it finds that undue hardship would result.

Article V Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the association shall be from October 1 through September 30 for each calendar year.

Article VI General Membership Meetings

Regular meetings shall be held the second Tuesday of each month at 7:30 PM. The rules contained in the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with this Constitution and any special rules of order the Association may adopt.

The annual meeting for election of officers and determination of annual dues shall be held on the second Tuesday of each September at 7:30 PM. All elections shall be by secret ballot. A simple majority vote of the voting membership present shall constitute a quorum of the General Membership.

Article VII Officers

The officers of the Association shall be: President; Vice President; Secretary; Treasurer; and repeater trustee.

Terms of the officers shall commence on the date of the first regular meeting in October of the year elected and election of officers will be held yearly. Any office left vacant by reason of death, disability, or

resignation shall be filled at the next regular meeting following the occurrence. Officers of the Association will be elected by a simple majority vote of the members present.

Officers of the Association can be removed by a 2/3 majority vote of the membership of the Association.

Article VIII Duties of Officers

The President shall preside over all meetings as far as possible and is responsible to the membership for the activities and growth of the Association.

The Vice President shall assume the duties of the President in his absence and shall assist the President.

The Secretary shall keep a written record of all meetings and have these records available at all regular membership and board meetings and shall maintain correspondence as needed.

The Treasurer shall receive and give receipts for all monies received by the club, and will keep an accurate and detailed account of all monies received and/or paid out by the club. This record shall be available, in written form, at all regular membership and board meetings.

The Repeater Trustee shall be that member of the Association who holds the license for the Association's repeater. He shall be responsible for the repeater operation as prescribed by the Rules and Regulations of the F.C.C. and by the Executive Board.

Article IX Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers of the Association and the Repeater Trustee. The board shall meet not less than once each quarter of the year to conduct the business of the Association at dates, times and places to be determined by the Association President.

A quorum of the Executive Board shall be three members.

The Executive Board shall be answerable to the general membership and is charged with the overall care and maintenance of Association property, the collection of monies owed to the Association and expenditures of the Association funds. The board may authorize the treasurer to make reasonable expenditures of Association funds for day-to-day operation of its activities. New and/or major expenditures shall not be made without approval of the general membership.

Article X Amendments

Any and all changes in the Constitution shall require notification of proposed changes to all members not less than 30 days prior to the voting date. Notification must be in writing to each individual member, with delivery by hand or U.S. mail.

Changes in this Constitution can only be made by a 2/3 majority vote of the membership of the Association.

Article XI Dissolution of the Association

Should, at some date, three-fourths of the entire voting membership of the Lapeer County Amateur Radio Association decide to dissolve the Association, all remaining funds and monies, including those from the sale of any Association-owned properties and equipment shall be divided between selected non-profit associations benefiting amateur radio chosen by a majority of the full membership at the time of such dissolution.
