
A note from the race organizers:

Record Rainfall During the 2011 Spring

If you feel like the spring of 2011 was particularly wet then you are absolutely correct. The spring season spans from March 1 to May 31 and the three main climate sites across Southeast Michigan (Detroit, Flint, and Saginaw) all placed in the top ten wettest springs on record.

To put the wet weather into perspective, Detroit had 52 days of measurable precipitation this spring. The average for spring is 37 days of measurable precipitation for Detroit. This places 2011 in first place for the most days of precipitation during the spring. Flint had 45 days of measurable precipitation in the spring of 2011 (average is 34 days) which is tied for 6th most number of spring days. Saginaw had 44 days of measurable precipitation in the spring of 2011 (average is 33 days) which is the 4th most number of days.

Looking back at the three sites individually, Flint was the big winner with 17.00 inches of precipitation for the 2011 spring season. This makes 2011 the wettest spring in Flint's history. This smashed the old record of 13.80 inches set back in 1945. Flint's climate records date back to 1921. Flint recorded 3.92 inches of precipitation in March (6th wettest March), 5.47 inches in April (5th wettest April), and 7.61 inches in May (2nd wettest May to this point).

Detroit Metro Airport received 14.60 inches of precipitation during the 2011 spring season, making it the 2nd wettest on record. The wettest spring on record for Detroit occurred in 1947 when 16.31 inches fell. Detroit's records date back to 1874.

Although Saginaw did not receive quite as much rain, their total was also noteworthy. Saginaw received 11.88 inches of rain during the spring placing them as the 10th wettest spring on record. More impressive was that over half of the total rainfall fell during the month of April. April received 5.96 inches of rain making it the third wettest April on record. Saginaw's records date back to 1900.

Michigan's farmers were some of the hardest hit by the heavy spring rainfall. Wet fields delayed planting and some farmers will struggle this fall to get crops harvested before the growing season ends. The above normal rainfall also delayed road construction projects and resulted in an unusually high number of mosquitos.



Devastating Tornadoes of 2011

The 2011 severe weather season has already reached a very sad designation; the highest number of deaths from tornadoes since modern day warning systems went into place. The United States typically averages around 60 tornado deaths nationwide each year. Through June of 2011, preliminary numbers indicate 537 deaths have already been attributed to tornadoes, nearly nine times the normal number for a full year. This unfortunately places 2011 in the record books, making it the deadliest tornado season since official records began in 1950, and tied for the 5th deadliest tornado season when compared to un-official records dating all the way back to 1875.

Many people are wondering why the 2011 tornado season has been so bad. One contributing factor may be the La Niña episode that began late last summer and ended this spring. La Niña is a climate phenomenon that occurs when below normal water temperatures are observed near the equator in the Pacific Ocean. These cooler water temperatures effect global weather patterns and tend to lead to a very active storm track with an above normal amount of severe weather across the plains states during the spring months.


A bigger contributing factor for the high number of tornado fatalities in 2011 is that several violent tornadoes have made direct hits on highly populated areas. It is a common myth that tornadoes are less likely to hit cities. This misconception can be attributed to the fact that cities make up such a small portion of the total land area of the United States allowing the majority of our tornadoes to occur in sparsely populated areas.

The bulk of the tornado fatalities in 2011 occurred on 2 particular days. April 27th was the third day of the dangerous "Dixie Outbreak" extending from April 25th-April 28th that rivaled the "Super Outbreak" of April 3-4th, 1974. During those four days, tornadoes ripped across the Deep South from Texas to Virginia with the hardest hit areas located across northern Mississippi and Alabama. NWS preliminary records indicate 321 people were killed between April 25th and April 28th.

The other tragic day occurred on Sunday May 22, 2011 when an EF-5 tornado hit the city of Joplin, Missouri. The Joplin tornado was on the ground for 13 miles with a 6 mile stretch indicative of EF-5 damage. The Joplin tornado had winds in excess of 200 miles per hour with a width of three quarters of a mile. Over 1000 injuries were reported from the tornado with preliminary numbers indicating 151 people were killed by the violent storm. This is the most fatalities from a single tornado since the Flint/Beecher Tornado of June 8, 1953 when 116 people were killed here in Michigan.



Weather Spotting Review

When calling in a report please use the "TEL" system which stands for time, event, and location (county/city) of the event. The location of the event is very important to us. Please identify your location by giving us your County first so that we can narrow down your position, then by giving us your City, and major nearby crossroads. If you are reporting wind speed or hail size, please remember to mention if the value was measured or estimated. If making a damage report, please reference the closest major intersection. The list below outlines what information that should be reported to aid our warning operations.

- Wind gusts over 40 mph
- Hail with a half inch diameter or larger (plain M&M or bigger)
- Funnel Clouds
- Tornados
- Waterspouts
- Rainfall rates of 1" per hour or more
- Significant flooding of rivers or streets
- All Post Storm Damage
