This month's Sites:

Musical Morse Code

Many people are familiar with the Morse Code "V" (dit dit dit dah) that pervades Beethoven's Fifth Symphony. The Beethoven/Morse Vs were so popular during WWII that the Allied countries adopted this symphony as their unofficial musical accompaniment to their slogan, "V" for Victory. It mattered not one bit that Beethoven was German, and wrote the music a full thirty years before Morse developed his code. To the Allies, it fit their purpose, and that was good enough. Thus, a generation who, with the exception of Ham, military, and news radio operators, knew nothing of Morse Code could tell you what the Morse Code V sounded like.

Jump forward several decades, and discover a music writer named Barrington Somers Pheloung (Note 1), who composed the music for the widely acclaimed series <u>Inspector Morse</u> (Note 2). This series was televised in the U.S. as part of Masterpiece Mysteries. I was taken by the characterizations, themes, plots, and music, and am happy to watch them repeatedly.

One thing that Pheloung did was to occasionally include Morse Code within the score for Inspector Morse. Sometimes he would name the villain, and other times he would include a red herring to throw viewers off track. A sample of this may be heard in the final episode of Inspector Morse. The YouTube video is included below. It starts with a dialogue exchange between the main characters, then goes to the credits, with the theme music playing. Listen carefully to the strings (then high winds) playing M - O - R - S - E throughout. Even though Pheloung didn't quite stick with the exact requirements for element spacing, the code comes through in a way that fits well with the haunting theme.

What? Morse Code on a wine label?

There's no mistake here. An Australian wine maker, Henry's Drive Vignerons, uses Morse code to identify some of their wine types. (Note 3). Look about a half page down the wine listings for "Morse Code Chardonnay," and "Morse Code Shiraz"

Henry's Drive began using Morse Code on their labels as a link with the history of the winery site. The site is on what used to be a stop for the Australian Mail Coach Service. Coincidentally, the stop was also a part of the telegraph service, much like American train stops were also telegraph offices. The founders of the winery thought that including Morse Code on their labels would carry a bit of history to their product, and to "...honour the Morse Codian Fraternity with this collection of fine wines."

Former WorldRadio Editor, CW Activist Nancy Anne Kott, WZ8C, SK:

03/04/2014 CW promoter Nancy A. Kott, WZ8C, of Metamora, Michigan, died March 2. She was 58. Kott was the former editor of WorldRadio and WorldRadio Online magazines. She was an enthusiastic member of the FISTS CW Club — the International Morse Preservation Society and a regular presence at the organization's booth at Dayton Hamvention

"There is something magical about being able to put two wires together and start going dit-dit-dit dit-dit," Kott told The New York Times in 2006, after the FCC had proposed dropping the Morse code requirement to acquire HF amateur privileges. "We are just going to have to get on the air and do what we do and hope for the best."

Kott was an honorary member of the <u>Texas DX Society</u> and a member of the TDXS DXpedition to Belize in 2006, recalled Steve Smothers, W9DX, who called Kott "an accomplished brass pounder and one of FISTS' most active members and promoters." She also operated as VP2V/WZ8C in 2007.

Kott was a member of the ARRL's <u>A-1 Operator Club</u>. Professionally she was a field representative for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (<u>CDC</u>). Survivors include her husband, Tim Lange.

HOW INMARSAT USED THE DOPPLER EFFECT TO TRACK DOWN MH370'S LAST KNOWN POSITION

British satellite firm Inmarsat discovered on March 9 that MH370 had continued flying for at least another six hours after its last voice transmission from the cockpit at 1:19 am on Saturday March 8.

It knew this from an electronic 'handshake' that the plane gave to one of its satellites. This placed it in one of two corridors, running north to Kazakhstan, or south to the Indian Ocean.

The satellite received several more pings from the aircraft, but Inmarsat weren't immediately able to work out its trajectory because the satellite isn't GPS enabled. However, the pings contained hidden clues in their wave frequencies. Inmarsat, using some very clever mathematical modelling, deduced that the frequency of the waves were changing in a way that gave away the plane's locations.

It's called the Doppler effect, named after the Austrian physicist Christian Doppler, who proposed it in 1842.

He noticed how wave frequencies changed as an observer moved around the source. In modern life we experience it frequently as the sounds of sirens from emergency service vehicles change as they move away from us.

A similar effect was occurring with MH370 that enabled Inmarsat to rule out a northerly trajectory. The frequencies of the pings it was returning meant it was travelling south.




